Impressive numbers found in 2024 annual report, but EDC's beginnings merit highlighting



Once again, the Economic Development Corporation of Elkhart County (EDC) has impressive numbers to share in our 2024 annual report.

However, instead of focusing on the data, it's worth reflecting on how this non-profit organization began.

I may not be "old as dirt," but I was there when the EDC was first imagined.

As a young farm business owner and Farm Bureau leader, I joined a group of community leaders who laid the groundwork for what became our EDC.

The EDC didn't happen overnight. It took a strategic plan, months of discussion, and the collaboration of a diverse community united by a shared goal: To build a sustainable, diversified economy. In 2001, the EDC held its first board meeting.

Elkhart County has long been known for its resilience and innovation — traits that helped us identify a risk in our heavy reliance on the RV industry. Rather than wait for disruption, we asked: Why not encourage innovation now while times are good?

Our diversification strategy was sometimes seen as anti-RV, but it was never about turning away from our strengths. Instead, it was about using them as a springboard into other sectors. With support from local government, businesses, chambers, and the RV industry itself, the EDC developed incentives to attract and retain a variety of businesses.

Today, Elkhart County's economy is more diverse than ever. The EDC is central to this progress, its success from a dedicated staff, supportive board, and collaborative community. As its role evolves, the EDC continues to focus on incentives while also helping companies reduce costs and improve workforce education.

I encourage you to read the annual report and see how your EDC is helping shape a

strong economic future for Elkhart County.

Empowering local manufacturers

Regional Skills Accelerator grant helps offset training costs, enhances bottom line

At the Economic Development Corporation of Elkhart County (EDC), we are committed to helping local companies enhance their bottom line by connecting them with various grants, incentives, and programs.

Training is one of our key priorities, and it can significantly contribute to creating a positive organizational culture.

The federal Regional Skills Accelerator training grant is designed to help offset training expenses. The 50-50 matching grant, from the Rehabilitation Services Administration, provides employers with a subsidy of up to \$750 per employee up to a maximum of \$15,000 per employer.

The key qualifiers are the training be done by an approved provider/trainer; the employee receive a certification and/or a certificate of completion; and an element of financial reward for the employee completing the training.

If you're interested in this grant opportunity, we will guide you through the entire process. That begins with

a conversation and the development of a training program.
